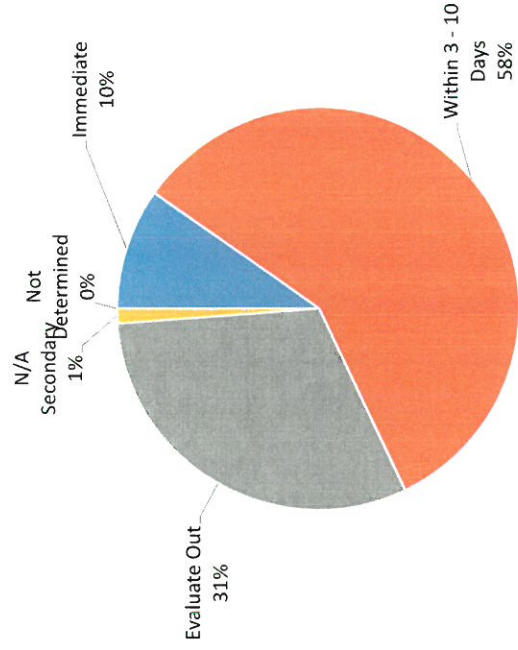

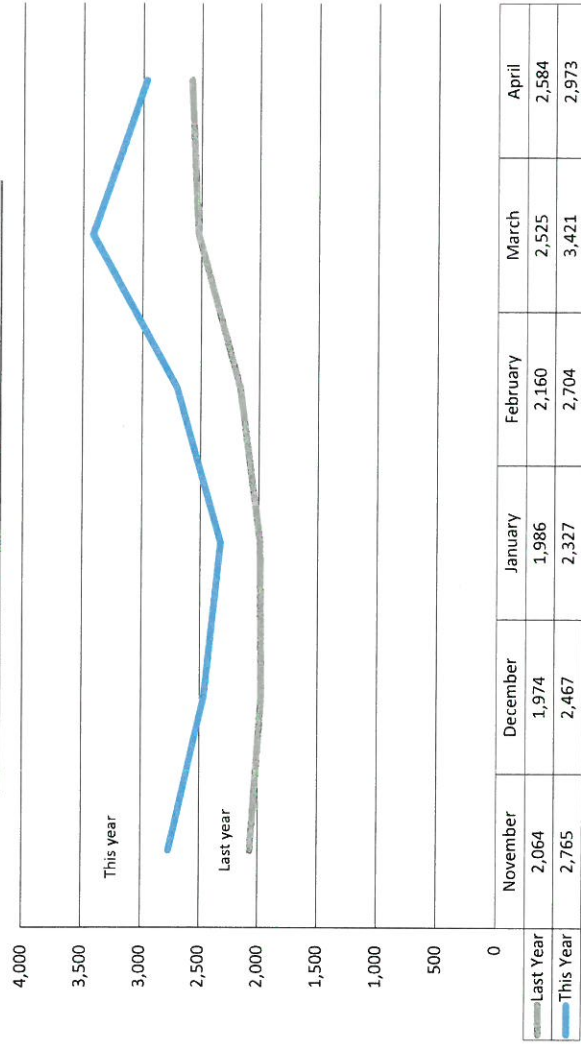

6 Months Referrals Trend Comparison



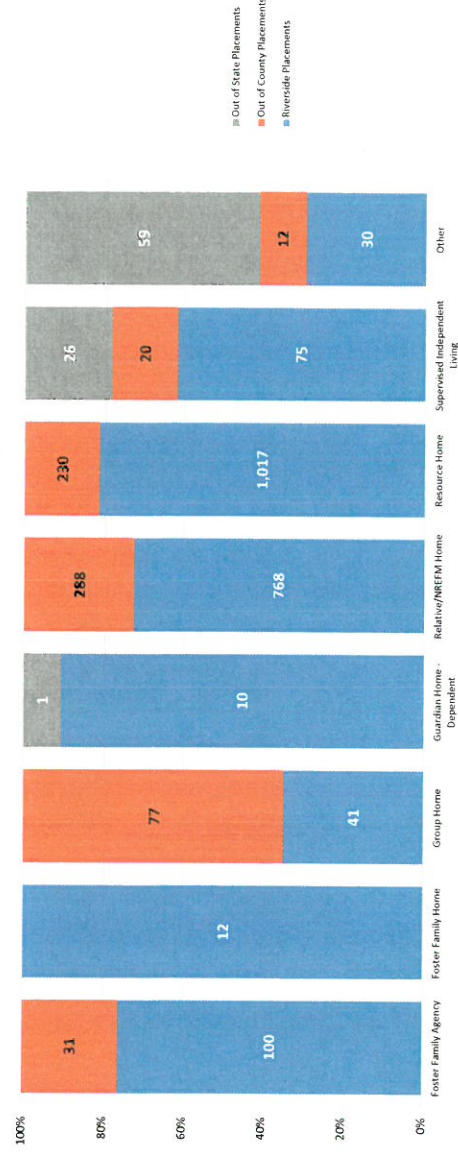

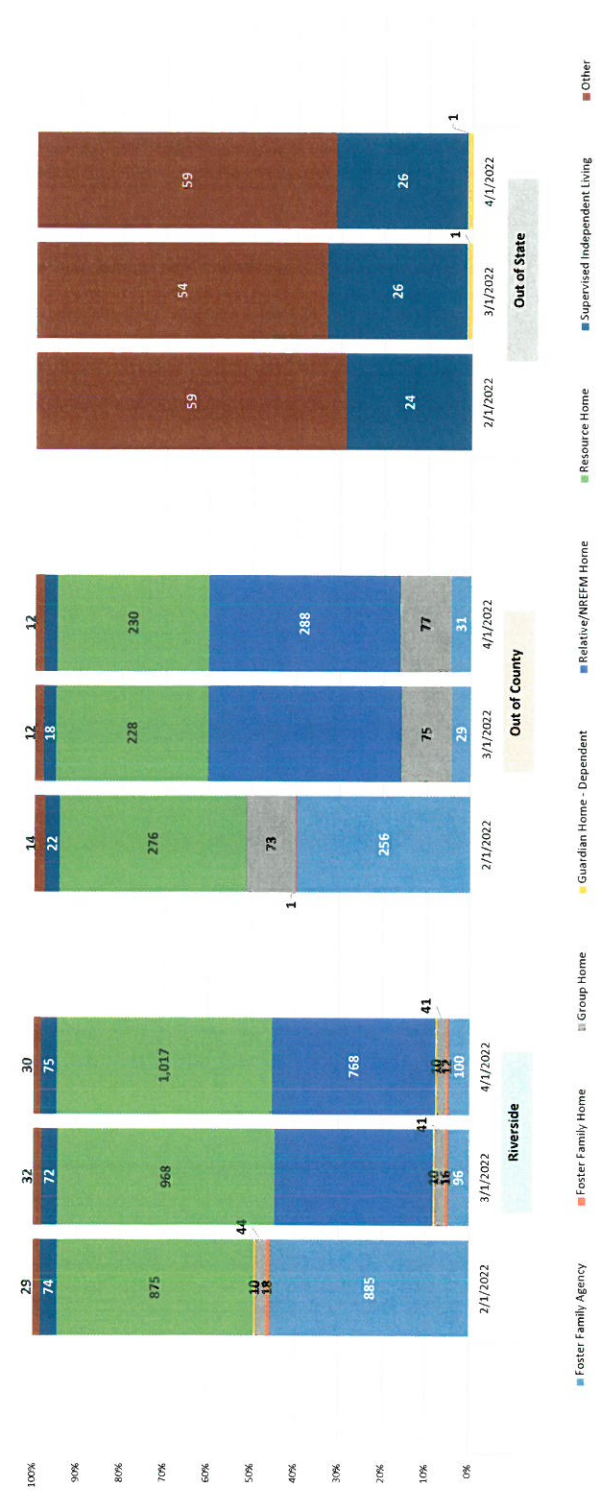
